The production possibilities curve is also called the PPF or the production

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possibilities frontier. The PPF simply shows the trade-offs in production volume between two choices. All choices along the curve shows production efficiency of both goods. Production points inside the curve show an economy is not producing at its comparative advantage.

The tradeoff in production can then be

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framed as a choice between capital and consumer goods, which will become relevant later. Therefore, this example will also adopt guns and butter as the axes for the production possibilities frontier. Technically speaking, the units on the axes could be something like pounds of butter and a number of guns.

How to Graph and Read the Production Possibilities Frontier

During this period, Europeans had the “trade ax” that they used for pretty much anything and everything — felling trees, splitting wood, butchering animals, etc. But the trade ax wasn’t very efficient in the woodcutting department. It would take Europeans migrating to North America for the ax to make another leap forward.
